In the upcoming weeks students will be selecting courses and meeting individually with their counselors to review their selections. Counselor Lessons: Winter 2019

In December, counselors will present all middle school students with an academic and career planning lesson. The lessons use the Naviance Student (formerly Family Connection) tool accessible through student Blackboard 24/7 sites. Students have access to Naviance Student throughout their time at Lake Braddock and will continue to use it during future career lessons in high school. The purpose of these lessons is to help students think about their future career plans and how academic planning now can impact choices and decisions made later. Students are also encouraged to open their minds to possible career plans that they may not have considered before, but that would be appropriate for them based on assessments completed.

In these lessons, both 7th and 8th grade students will write a SMART goal pertaining to academic progress achieved by the end of the second quarter. The components of a SMART goal will be reviewed and students will input their goals into their Naviance Student account.

Both grade levels complete tasks in Naviance Student revolving around exploring careers as well. Seventh grade students complete an assessment called the "Strengths Explorer." This assessment asks various questions that determine students' personality types. Students are then given three central themes revolving around their personal strengths. Themes such as "competing," "relating," and "presence" are among possible outcomes. Students are then shown career pathways that maximize these strengths. Eighth grade students complete an assessment called the "Cluster Finder." In this assessment, students answer questions about their interests. Their interests are then matched up with career clusters and students explore various career possibilities.

The Naviance Student account is available through all student Blackboard 24/7 accounts. Parents can ask their child to share it with them independently at any time for a fun discussion.

SIS ParentVue Account Activation

Enrolling parents who have not yet created their ParentVue account will be receiving a letter in the mail that will provide them with an activation code and instructions on how to set up your account. Please note that this activation code is time sensitive and will only be good for 45 days from the time it was printed. Be on the lookout for this letter right around the start of winter break.

DEADLINE FOR AAP LEVEL IV REFERRALS

This is a friendly reminder that the deadline for referring students in Grades 2-7 for AAP full-time Level IV consideration is due **no later than January 9**, **2020**. Parents are welcome to submit early, but no late referrals will be accepted. We advise parents not to wait for pending abilities test scores if they would like their student screened. While the Grade 2 screening pool casts a starting point for screening some students, test scores are only one factor in the eligibility decision.

If you would like more information about Level IV AAP services or the screening process for Level IV, there are two parent presentations available on the <u>AAP public website</u> that have the same information that was shared at our local school information meetings. 


